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American Sign Language Resources

What is American Sign Language (ASL)?

ASL is a visual language that does not rely on speech or sound. The shape, placement, movement of the hands, along with facial expressions and body movements are used to communicate effectively in American Sign Language. ASL can be used with children with or without amplification to ensure full language and communication access to their environment. Infants who are deaf or hard of hearing will acquire ASL through purposeful exposure. American Sign Language is a complete language.

Why American Sign Language?

Early accessible language is vital for the growth and development of all children, especially children who are deaf and hard of hearing. Accessible languages that do not rely on sound, such as ASL, help develop communication and language when a child is deaf or hard of hearing regardless of whether amplification devices are used. Children exposed to American Sign Language sign their first words at approximately six to eight months old. Learning American Sign Language will not interfere with a child's ability to utilize listening and spoken language. A good foundation in ASL often leads to increased language fluency, literacy skills, social interactions, and academic performance later in life. https://tinyurl.com/dy2ycjaa

Where can we learn American Sign Language?

Fluent ASL signers in the Deaf community are valuable resources for learning ASL. Local colleges (community or university) and community organizations, such as the local parks and recreation centers, may offer American Sign Language (ASL) classes for people of all ages. Online resources, such as sign language classes, apps. and videos are also available. This brochure gives options to help you learn American Sign Language.

How do I start?

Starting early is important and can start with simple words like more, milk, eat, and all done. You can put two signs together such as "milk" + "all done" and grow your child's language as they grow. These signs help your child communicate their needs. Make it fun - practice American Sign Language in your daily life and activities.
